#### 42<sup>nd</sup> Annual Natchitoches-NSU Folk Festival a Great Success

The audience at the 42<sup>nd</sup> annual Natchitoches-NSU Folk Festival held on July 23 was entertained and educated about the rich and diverse cultural offerings of the state. The Festival featured traditional Louisiana foods, Kidfest activities, music, traditional crafts, narrative sessions, musical informances, and cultural exhibits. This year's Festival theme "Stronger Together: The Power of Traditional Folk Culture" was a great success, with a very happy audience.

The Festival opened on Saturday morning with music performances in Prather Coliseum by Amanda Shaw & the Cute Guys, Flashback, Geno Delafose and French Rockin' Boogie, the Haggis Rampant Celtic Band, Joyful Sounds, the LaCour Trio, Les Frères Michot, Cajun and line dance lessons by the Cajun French Music Association Dance Troupe, Yvette Landry and Beau Thomas, a special musical tribute to the late Hardrick Rivers, and an interpretive performance by the Winnsboro Easter Rock Ensemble of their Easter eve vigil. Also

highly popular were performances by the Thistle Dancers and Pipers and the Rising Dragon Lion Dance Team, and participatory music and dances with the Caddo Culture Club and the Louisiana Czech Heritage Dancers.

In addition to stage performances there were narrative sessions and music informances, including conversations about Acadian brown cotton, the traditions of the Caddo Culture Club, and a roundtable memorial of the late, great Hardrick Rivers. Also featured were music informances by Amanda Shaw, Les Frères Michot, and Geno Delafose. Outdoor activities included demonstrations by the Central Louisiana Dutch Oven Cookers, the Red River Smiths, and Wash Day, presented by the West Baton Rouge Museum. This year the Festival continued a series of free workshops for Festival attendees. A Cajun guitar workshop led by guitarist Yvette Landry and fiddler

Suchanek took first in the 60 and up championship division, with Ron Pace of Alexandria

beadwork, baskets, Czech Pysanky eggs, filé making, flintknapping, folk art, knives, music instruments, quilting, pottery, spinning & weaving, tatting, walking sticks, whittling and needlework, wood carving, and more. Eight food vendors provided a cornucopia of traditional Louisiana foods to the Festival audience.

## Scholars' recruits ADVANCE program participants

The Louisiana Scholars' College (LSC) at Northwestern State University hosted a recruiting event for older participants of NSU's ADVANCE Program for Young Scholars (ADVANCE). ADVANCE is a three-week residential program that offers a challenging and rewarding curriculum for academically motivated middle and high school students. Students enroll in one course for three weeks of intense and demanding study and cover an entire year's worth of school material. Courses have a maximum of 15 students creating a low student-faculty ratio and are taught by a talented group of highly qualified Instructor-Teaching Assistant (TA) teams.

While the academic curriculum is central to the ADVANCE experience, the program ensures that students have a fabulous time when they are not in class. The residential staff members offer a wide variety of social and recreational activities to assist in creating lasting friendships and strengthen the ADVANCE community.

ADVANCE students come from many different backgrounds and have a wide variety of opinions and beliefs. Engaging in such diversity is part of the educational experience that the program provides, and ADVANCE encourages students to appreciate the similarities and respect the differences that make each student unique.

The Louisiana Scholars' College serves as the state's selective-admission honors college of the liberal arts and sciences. Its mission is to provide highly motivated students with a rigorous, customized honors education firmly grounded in the liberal arts and sciences.

Students may pursue a traditional major or an interdisciplinary concentration in Classical Studies; Fine and Performing Arts; Foreign Languages; Humanities and Social Thought; Philosophy, Politics, and Economics or Scientific Inquiry.

The Scholars' College offers small classes, a close-knit community, and supportive faculty who are committed to student success. Most classes are seminars in which ideas are exchanged in an open and supportive environment. There are also opportunities for internships, undergraduate research, and study abroad.
