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## Watson's Living Library Oct. 4

## NSU IRb announces updates, changes

Northwestern State University's Institutional Review Board is updating some policies and procedures, according to IRB Director and Chair **Dr. Jim Mischler**. Faculty and students who are working with or will work with the IRB on their planned research projects this year should be aware of changes.

An institutional review board is a committee that applies research ethics by reviewing the methods proposed for research to ensure they are ethical. IRB approve, reject, monitor and review biomedical and behavioral research involving human subjects.

"The IRB application process has gone through important changes for 2022-23 in order to make sure federal laws are followed when it comes to the health and welfare of a human subject," Mischler explained. "Please review the new IRB Researcher Handbook carefully before submitted an application."

Beginning Oct. 1, applications can be submitted online, rather than by email.


The College of Nursing and Allied Health is piloting one portal while the rest of the university will use a separate portal through Moodle. A newly revised IRB Research Handbook provides details on the submission systems and a new IRB Office is now on the Natchitoches campus. A new website is also under construction but not fully updated.

In addition, Mischler said new members have been added to NSU's IRB in order to get a wider variety of input from across campus. He would like to develop more contacts with individuals in the community to provide additional input on reviews.

In celebration of October as National Manufacturing Month, Northwestern State University's Department of Engineering Technology is organizing the 5th annual Engineering Technology Symposium from 8 a.m.-noon Thursday, October 20 in the Student Union Ballroom. Regional manufacturers will participate to offer information about their companies and relevant STEM career opportunities available.

**Dr. Moftah Ali**, assistant professor in the Department of Engineering Technology, will be featured speaker, along with local industry representatives, graduates of the program and NSU administrators.

Ali holds a Ph.D. in electrical and computer engineering from the University of Western Ontario, Canada. He proposed several novel low-complexity techniques in his doctoral thesis work that can be employed to design energy efficient multicarrier and multi-carrier CDMA systems for applications in in LTE-4G5G networks and satellite communications. Ali's primary research areas include wired/wireless digital communication systems and digital signal processing. During his Ph.D. studies, Ali published several peer-reviewed articles in journals and presented in many IEEE conferences and university symposiums. He actively reviews manuscripts for


IEEE conference proceedings and peer-reviewed articles. He has eight years of industrial related experience and nine years of academic experience.

"Former facilities director Mike Duty was watching and sent me a text message saying that anybody that was watching tonight's production wouldn't know that it was the first time we had ever done a production for ESPN or that these students had never worked with the equipment before," said **David Antilley**, NSU-TV manager. "He said it was like watching the main ESPN channel. National Heritage Award, the Ensemble under the direction of Hattie Addison Burkhalter provided a demonstration and discussion of a rare ritual tradition that dates back to the antebellum period. Dr. Susan Roach, Professor of English, Emerita, at Louisiana Tech University, introduced the keynote and moderated a Q&A with the Ensemble and conference attendees.

The conference was a great success, with 33 scholars, creative writers, and cultural authorities participating in 9 separate panels.

Conference participants came from Alabama, Ohio, Texas, and Nottingham, England, as well as from throughout Louisiana. Several of the presenters were NSU faculty and alumni. In addition to the keynote presentation, some of the many topics discussed included Louisiana literature, archaeology, juke joints, ghosts, legends, vampires, history, politics, foodways, climate change and the environment, hoodoo and voodoo, race relations, service learning, folkways, juke joints, folktales, and the casket girls of New Orleans.

committee.



## Gauthier will be honored as Culturer Bearer Oct. 8

Mestiza cultural authority Rhonda Gauthier will be named a Louisiana Tradition Bearer by the Louisiana Folklife Commission and honored at a ceremony Saturday, October 8 at 2 p.m. at the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame and Northwest Louisiana History Museum at 800 Front Street in Natchitoches. Serving as a folklife ambassador for the Louisiana Folklife Commission, Dr. Shane Rasmussen, professor of English and director of the Louisiana Folklife Center at Northwestern State University, will talk with Gauthier about her lifetime spent preserving Louisiana's traditional folklife. The event is free and open to the general public.

An Adeasonos and member of the Choctaw-Apache Tribe of Ebarb and president of the Ho Minti Society, Inc., Gauthier grew up outside of Zwolle. As a young girl she began learning from the women in her immediate and extended families' traditional arts such as crochet, embroidery, hand sewing, quilting, cooking, baking and animal tending. Her grandmother taught her midwifery, the use of natural

herbs to treat common ailments and herb gardening. Everything she learned as a young girl followed her through to adulthood. After earning a B.A. in anthropology and history from Northwestern State, she worked in the fields of research, genealogy and history, first part-time as a cultural interpreter at Fort St. Jean Baptiste, and later as a fulltime interpretive ranger at Nuestra Senora de Pilar de Los Adaes and Fort Jesup State Historic Site. Since 2000 she has worked in the Louisiana Regional Folklife program as an assistant to Dr. Dayna Lee, as an assistant to historical archaeologist Dr. George Avery in the Los Adaes Program and as community coordinator for the Creole Heritage Center. She served as the liaison for the Creole Center to the St. Augustine Historical Society, the Cane River Creole community and Creole communities across Louisiana. Her work during these years included grant writing, research, Creole genealogy, coordinating conferences and maintaining the Badin-Roque Historic structure on Cane River Lake.

In 2005, she produced the film "Maize to Masa," which documents the Choctaw-Apache process of nixtamalization, a traditional maize preparation process in which dried kernels are cooked and steeped in an alkaline solution, usually water and food-grade lime, to make hominy. The Choctaw-Apache community still uses this process to make tamale dough. In 2008, Gauthier returned to Louisiana State Parks as an interpretive ranger until retiring in 2018. In 2021. Gauthier worked with the Sabine Parish Tourist Commission and Zwolle Depot Museum Board doing

research and volunteer work to ready the Depot Museum. Research, genealogy and cultural studies have been never-ending passions. Since 1994, she has worked closely with the Choctaw-Apache Tribe of Ebarb, consulting, researching genealogy, grant writing, working with the Rising Sun Youth and serving on powwow and tribal recognition committees.

The ceremony and discussion are part of a series of events throughout the state for Folklife Month in Louisiana. The event is sponsored by the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame and Northwest Louisiana

History Museum, the Louisiana Folklife Center, and the Louisiana Folklore Society, and the Louisiana Division of the Arts and the Department of Culture, Recreation, and Tourism. Funding is also provided by the National Endowment for the Arts, Art Works, and the Louisiana Endowment for the Humanities, the state affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities, in collaboration with the Louisiana Folklife Commission.
