Northwestern Mission. Methodology: The assessment process includes:

(1) Data from assessment tools (both direct – indirect, quantitative and qualitative) are collected and returned to the Vice Presidents of Technology, Innovation, and Economic Development's designee and stored in secure digital format;

(2) The Vice President and support staff will analyze the data to determine whether the applicable outcomes are met;

(3) Results from the assessment will be discussed with the appropriate staff;

(4) Individual meetings will be held with staff as required to address found concerns;

(5) The Vice President, in consultation with the staff and senior leadership, will determine proposed changes to measurable outcomes, assessment tools for the next assessment period and, where needed, service changes in response to assessment findings.

Service Outcomes:

SO 1. ECE will assist with marketing electronic learning programs and advising students who are enrolling in distance and non-credit programs.

Measure 1.1.

ECE will assist with marketing and recruiting of online students with the goal of increasing the number of new online students annually. Once students are reached via marketing strategies, it is essential to assist them through University processes to ensure they do not get lost in the administrative veins to admission and enrollment. Semester- to- semester comparisons will continue with the goal of 6% online student enrollment increase annually.

Finding: Target met. There was an increase of 6.6% in number of new online students from Fall 2015 to Fall 2016. There was an increase of 6.4% in number of new online students from Spring 2016 to Spring 2017.

Analysis: This enrollment data shows that the 6% growth target has been attainable and sustainable through the 2016-17 year.

Action - Decision or Recommendation: Based on 2016-17 results, the goal to increase enrollment by 6% in semester-to-semester comparisons will remain. Because the 6% goal was attained for 2016-17, current marketing and advising methods will continue to be utilized in an effort to produce continued increases in enrollment.

SO 2. ECE will offer a variety of non-credit enrichment courses for community members who are interested in pursuing areas of personal interest.

Measure 2.1.

ECE will offer non-credit enrichment courses each semester for community members who are interested in pursuing areas of personal interest. These areas of interest are wide and varied which allows for a broad scope of offerings. Because of the vast possibilities, offering 12 non-credit courses each semester is feasible.

Finding: Target not met. Below are the non-credit offerings for each semester beginning in Summer 2016 moving through Spring 2017, and specific course offerings can be seen in Pathways Publications for Summer 2016, Fall 2016, and Spring 2017-Appendix B.

Analysis: This course offering data shows that the average number of courses offered per semester during the 2016-17 school year was 12. This average includes semesters where greater than 12 and less than 12 non-credit courses were offered. While the average non-credit course offerings was 12 for the 2016-17 year, the total offered for Spring 2017 was 11. That was the only semester that did not meet the goal of 12 offerings.

Action - Decision or Recommendation: Based on the 2016-17 non-credit course offerings, ECE will continue to recruit instructors who can offer non-credit personal enrichment courses that align with the interest of community members so that a minimum of 12 non-credit courses can be taught each semester.

SO 3. ECE will facilitate dual enrollment opportunities for high school students that allow them to achieve university and high school credit.

Measure 3.1.

ECE will facilitate dual enrollment opportunities for high school students with a target goal to maintain a minimum threshold of total enrollees each semester. Maintaining a minimum threshold of dual enrollment students will ensure dual enrollment capacity meets a set standard while navigating partnerships with high schools and increased ACT score requirements. The minimum threshold is 1200 students enrolled in dual enrollment each semester.

Finding: Target met. Overall, there has been a steady increase in the number of students taking dual enrollment courses for the past several years.

Analysis: This dual enrollment data shows the minimum threshold of 1200 dual enrollment students was attained in Fall 2016 and maintained through Spring 2017. This indicates that the threshold is reasonable, attainable, and maintainable.

Action - Decision or Recommendation: Based on the 2016-17 dual enrollment numbers, the threshold of 1200 dual enrollment students proved to be attainable and maintainable. The threshold will remain at 1200 minimum dual enrollment students for 2017-18. This goal to maintain enrollment numbers is aimed to help offset the possible increased criteria to participate while still promoting high levels of enrollment.

SO 4. ECE will facilitate professional development opportunities as well as instructional design and technical support to faculty.

Measure 4.1.

ECE will provide quality professional development opportunities as well as instructional design and technical support to faculty. The professional development and support mechanisms are designed to assist faculty with topics relevant to instructing courses in higher education. The goal is to attain 100% faculty/staff satisfaction with offered professional development opportunities as measured by the Professional Development Survey- Appendix A.

Finding: Target not met. For 2016-17, the average satisfaction rate as measured by the Professional Development Survey- 97%.

Analysis: This satisfaction rating shows that the vast majority of faculty/staff who have attended professional development were satisfied with the quality of the workshops. While the goal is 100% satisfaction, this number is an average of satisfaction ratings on several factors involved in professional development workshops. Participants are asked to rate satisfaction on a five-point scale (Strongly Agree to Strongly Disagree) on whether the program met their expectations, whether the objective was clearly stated, length of the program, whether enough examples were included, visual and audio quality, presentation of the content, management of the session, and organization of content. 97% is the weighted average of ratings across all of the criteria. In order to reach 100%, every faculty member would have to rate each measure in every workshop they attend as "Strongly Agree."

Action - Decision or Recommendation: Based on the findings for participant satisfaction for professional developments offered in 2016-17, the goal will remain to achieve 100% satisfaction as measured by the Professional Development Survey.

Summary of key findings and/or decisions:

Through the 2016-17 assessment, the Office of Electronic and Continuing Education has discovered unit strengths, weaknesses, and developed actionable items based on those findings. Efforts to increase online student enrollment proved to be productive as the goal to increase new online enrollment by 6% annually was met and will continue to be the bar for continual growth through 2017-18. To ensure the threshold minimum of 12 non-credit courses are offered each semester, efforts will be focused on recruiting instructors for those offerings. While anticipating changes to dual-credit prerequisite requirements, a reasonable and maintainable minimum for enrollment was achieved–1200 students– and will continue to serve as the target goal for dual enrollment. Lastly, the quality of offered professional developments was shown to be stellar with a participant satisfaction rate of 97%, but the goal to achieve 100% participant satisfaction will remain the target for 2017-18.
