NSU Showcases ARGO Capabilities at LACD Annual Meeting

At the Louisiana Association of Conservation Districts (LACD) Annual Meeting last week, Travis Mitchell and Adelaide Soileau of Northwestern State University's Advanced Remote Geospatial Operations Lab highlighted the transformative role of emerging drone technology in forestry and agriculture, demonstrating how advanced UAS applications enhance monitoring, mapping, and data-informed land management. These efforts underscore the ARGO Lab's technical capabilities and the strength of its partnership with the Natural Resources Conservation Service, while continuing to provide services at no cost to farmers, landowners, and partners across Louisiana. I commend Mr. Mitchell and Ms. Soileau for their leadership and for representing Northwestern State with distinction while expanding the reach and impact of our ARGO program statewide.

SWEPCO Investment Expands Hands-On STEM Learning at NSU

The School of STEM recently received a \$5,000.00 contribution from Southwestern Electric Power Company through the SWEPCO Foundation to support STEM outreach across north Louisiana. This gift will help fund hands-on learning experiences, including N-Side STEM Day for high school juniors and seniors, as well as the purchase of reusable STEM edutainment kits for future outreach events. This partnership was made possible through the efforts of Northwestern State University's Office of Economic Development, which works to connect the university with business and industry partners to advance workforce-aligned education and community impact. NSU Cheer earned a second-place finish overall at Nationals in Division I Gameday Cheer and will compete in the World Cup tonight, while the NSU Pom Line returned to Nationals for the first time in several years and delivered a strong performance with zero deductions from the judges. Brown is a nationally recognized sports artist and the official artist for the Louisiana Sports Hall of Fame, celebrated for capturing the emotion and movement of athletic competition. Desselle is an award-winning journalist and television anchor whose artistic foundation at NSU helped shape a distinguished career in broadcast journalism. Poole is a highly respected music educator and conductor whose ensembles have earned numerous state and national honors and who credits his graduate studies at NSU as instrumental to his success. Please join us for the NSU Wind Symphony concert on Saturday, March 7, where the inductees will be honored, followed by a reception celebrating their achievements.

Baseball Auction

On Saturday evening, Martha and I attended the annual Baseball Auction. Coach Bertrand, his coaching staff, and our student-athletes hosted an outstanding event that successfully raised funds to support the program. Athletics Update

College basketball games are 40 minutes long, and every second mattered for our Demons last week. On Monday, the men erased a 14-point deficit and scored four points in the final 13 seconds, securing a 64–63 win over UT Rio Grande Valley in Prather Coliseum on a free throw with 1.4 seconds remaining. Saturday in San Antonio, the scales balanced when UIW overcame a 13-point NSU lead and won 76–74 on free throws in the final second.

The Lady Demons earned a 67–57 road win Thursday at Houston Christian, but fell 66–53 Saturday at UIW. Both teams return home Saturday for a doubleheader against East Texas A&M-Commerce, beginning at 1 p.m. with the women's game.

The indoor track and field season opened this weekend at Texas Tech with many high-caliber performances by Northwestern competitors. Most notably, both the men's and women's 4x400-meter relay teams set school records. Sophomore Will Achee ran a leg on the men's relay

a day after breaking the NSU record individually in the 400-meter dash.

The reigning Southland Conference champion Lady Demon tennis team opened its spring season in Baton Rouge, falling to fifth-ranked LSU and then defeating Xavier.

As always, thank you for the work you do each day to support our students and advance the mission of Northwestern State University. I am grateful for your continued dedication and commitment as we move forward together this spring. The university will be closed tomorrow in observance of Martin Luther King Jr. Day, and will reopen with classes resuming on Tuesday.
