Remote Systems Science and Technology (RSST) is the application of remote systems in government, industry, and research. Remote systems can include unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) and remotely operated vehicles (ROVs). Remote systems can access locations outside the scope of human limitation, including far above tree lines and deep below the surface of water.

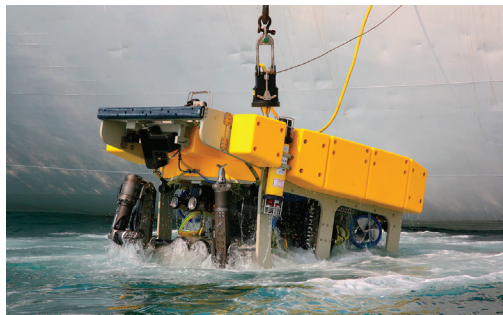

Career Options:

- Search and rescue—allows crews to have eyes on potential survivors after natural disasters sooner
- Wildlife monitoring—allows people to view potentially dangerous wildlife without having to risk safety
- Preservation—allows the documentation and preservation of historic structures and areas without potential human impact

- Mapping inaccessible or dangerous locations
- Storm tracking and monitoring
