- NSU is working on Enrollment Management Plan. Jana is working with Ruffalo/Noel Levitz.
- Frances has been working with Reatha on Enrollment Management Plan.
- Working to update the Diversity Plan.
- Camps: Boys and Girls State was last week. Cheerleader and Band camps are this week. Alan Pasch is working hard.
- Frances Welch and staff have renewed TRIO grant receiving more money this year.
- Work continues on eSports Center in one-half of the old bookstore of Friedman Student Union.
 eSports is a growing trend on university campuses. Reatha Cox and Ron Wright recently attended a conference on eSports.

- Working on CRNA program (needs survey almost ready to mail; proposal for monies will be complete by Thursday of this week). Have many alumni who are CRNAs volunteers to take students in clinical courses. Now have name of possible consultant from California.
- Ann Deshotels successfully defended her dissertation, now Dr. Deshotels.
- Presented at Alumni Board meeting on Shreveport Campus: changes over past 5 years; bill points
 to share; CON has 45% undergraduate program growth over past 5 years; and SAH grew 22%.
 From that growth, we have only increased faculty/staff positions 17% and of that increase in
 positions 75% have been externally funded.
- BSN, MSN, and DNP and post-masters certificate programs scheduled for 10-Year national accreditation visit September 14-17, 2020.

Drake Owens:

- Foundation/Gallaspy/Alumni Board meetings were held on June 28th at the Shreveport campus.
- Highlights from the meetings include the appointment of an ad hoc committee explore real estate
 investment opportunities, the appointment of Hammond Lake to serve as marketing consultant
 for the NSU Foundation/Alumni Association, plans for fall alumni events, and significant increases
 in oil and gas activity.
- PSC Foster Campbell joined board members at the Shreveport Campus on Friday to announce a \$75,000 contribution from SWEPCO bringing the total over the past three years to \$392,500 including state matching funds.
- Drs. Maggio, Clawson, and Hicks provided board members with an update on CONSAH activities highlighting progress and plans for expansion.
- \$180,000 received from BOR received last week to fund the Louise Mathilde Bradford Professorship in Social Work, Bacdayan Family First Generation Scholarship in Business, Bacdayan Family First Generation Scholarship in Health Science, and Michael Peter Manno First Generation Scholarship.
- Continued planning for the fall semester including faculty/staff luncheon, home and away tailgates, alumni reunions, homecoming, and promotion of alumni membership and unrestricted giving.

Greg Burke:

External:

- Demons Unlimited Foundation attainment is expected to exceed \$2.5 million, which would rank as the second highest total ever.
- The 2019-20 Demons Unlimited Foundation annual giving brochure has been printed and is being mailed. 2019-20 gifts are being received.

- N-Club currently at \$14,000 with a record 397 members (281 paying members and 116 Free Graduating Senior memberships).
 - Athletic Director is including N-Club membership in beginning of semester team talks.
 - Continuing to send monthly N-Club newsletters featuring N-Club member of the month, upcoming events, and new memberships.
 - Continue sending weekly N-Club renewal notices.
 - A track reunion was held in conjunction with Southland Conference championship meet at NSU and 25-year baseball reunion in recognition of 1994 conference champion/NCAA postseason team was held the weekend of May 3-5. Also, a softball alumni reunion was held the weekend of April 5-6.
- Vic's Kids Club membership revenue is at \$3,435 (goal was \$2,500).
- Overall ticket revenue (season and gate sales) now total \$362,140 which will be the second highest ticket sales total ever.
- Beginning on May 1, Demons Unlimited Foundation donors at the \$250 and higher level had first priority to order up to six tickets for the NSU-LSU game in Baton Rouge on September 14. Season tickets holders will next have access to these tickets, followed by the general public.
- Erika Moulder, a graduate of the Baylor University Sports Management program who has been working with the Seattle WNBA team in marketing and ticket sales, began her duties as NSU's new Peak Sports Management representative in June.
- The rescheduled NSU-LSU baseball game at Brown-Stroud Field on March 12 generated nearly \$50,000 in ticket sales, corporate hospitality areas, concessions and other revenue streams. NSU gained priceless publicity as the game was aired live on ESPN Plus and represented the first non-football and basketball event that ESPN has chosen to telecast. The Demons won 3-1!
- The NSU-LSU softball game on March 5 resulted in selling all chair back and general admission seats and generated \$3,056.
- Approximately \$200,000 in "quiet phase" commitments have been secured for the "Victorious" facility campaign with additional funding requests on the horizon.
- Dates have been finalized and planning continues for the nine-stop "Victory Tour" in late
 July to promote the upcoming football season. Stops will be held in Many, Alexandria,
 Shreveport/Bossier, Lake Charles, Lafayette, Baton Rouge, New Orleans, Houston, and
 Dallas.
- The N-Club Hall of Fame induction class of 2019 was announced in late June nine inductees, including one Distinguished Service Award honoree. Planning for the induction ceremony will continue through the summer and early fall.
- Plans are being developed for a "Screamin' Demons" student support group for athletic events.
- A record 128 responses were received to a postseason football season ticket holder survey and a similar survey was sent to basketball season ticket holders.
