At its February 2020 Board meeting, the Board of Supervisors for Louisiana System approved our new *Mission, Vision, and Values* statement. The transition from old to new mission statements becomes effective July 1, 2020.

Over the past six months, we have conducted a deliberate, holistic, and thoughtful analysis of our mission, roles, and functions in concert with the Louisiana Constitution, Article VIII, 5D (4), Acts 241 of 1987 and 1360 of 1997, the specified tasks per the Board of Regents Master Plan 2011, revised 2012, Northwestern State University Strategic Plan Assessment 2018-2019 – Building Momentum, and the 2019 Board of Regents Master Plan, Louisiana Prospers: Driving Our Talent Imperative.

The result is a forward-looking mission statement that is inclusive, embraces diversity, anticipates change, and facilitates education access and attainment to better prepare our students to positively impact the socio-economic conditions of our region, state, and nation.
