Weekly Update, September 2 - 8, 2018

Preliminary enrollment numbers for this fall are amazing! Official enrollment counts that will be released early this week will show another record enrollment for our university! We have surpassed the 11,000-student enrollment mark for the first time in the 134-year history of the school. I will forward the release once our report is finalized and submitted to the Board of Regents.

This week, we learned that three of our College of Nursing and School of Allied Health faculty received a prestigious honor. Dr. Danita Potter, Dr. Star Booker and Ann Deshotels were selected to be a part of the 2018 induction class at the Great 100 Nurses Celebration by the Great 100 Nurses Foundation. They were chosen based on their concern for humanity, their contributions to the nursing profession and their mentoring of others. We congratulate them for this honor and thank them for their contributions to our university and others.

In my weekly updates, I often highlight faculty initiatives as they relate to our Strategic Framework. This week, I want to thank our Department of English, Foreign Languages and Cultural Studies for their latest community enrichment initiative. Beginning in mid-September, the department will offer an English for Everyday Living class, a basic English speaking/listening/writing class for the Natchitoches community. The course is non-credit and designed for adults whose first (native) language is not English. We appreciate Dr. Mischler, graduate student Katie Rayburn and the faculty for recognizing this community need and designing a program to assist many who want to expand their ability to speak, listen and write in English. This initiative will certainly help many in our local community.

I spent Saturday afternoon dodging the raindrops at the Demon tailgate fields preparing for the football game versus Grambling State University. Saturday evening, I led our freshman students across the turf at Turpin Stadium for the Inferno Run. Then I watched our football team score an impressive victory over a big in-state rival and enjoyed another magical halftime performance by our spectacular Spirit of Northwestern Marching Band and the great Grambling band.
