Delaney Webb, also a psychology student, said one of the best times she had with her roommate was "eating ice cream together after lunch."


Patrick Johnson, a second year student didn't think having a roommate was hard. In fact, he thought his roommate was awesome.

TAs assisted teachers. They graded papers, checked homework, supervised study hall, and other duties the teachers assigned them.





An Academic Melting Pot

Students of all ages and backgrounds came from all over the United States to attend the 2006 ADVANCE program for young scholars, which acted as a melting pot, not only academically but also culturally.

According to information from the ADVANCE director's office, the diverse racial and ethnic background breakdown among the 175 students was 59.4% white, 29% Asian/Pacific Islander, 6.8% black and 2.2% Hispanic. There were 104 whites, 49 Asian/Pacific Islanders, 12 blacks, 4 Hispanics, 4 others and 2 Native Americans who attended the 2006 ADVANCE program. Whites made up 60% of the students at ADVANCE, while minorities made up the other 40%.






