Jones selected as NSU's 20th president

The Board of Supervisors for the University of Louisiana System voted unanimously to name **Marcus Jones** the 20th president of Northwestern State University Nov. 8.

Jones has served the institution in many ways throughout his 23-year career including roles such as professor of business law and international business, vice president for university affairs, and executive vice president for university and business affairs. He has most recently served as interim president since July of 2021.

"Northwestern is home to me. I know Northwestern and Northwestern knows me," Jones said. "This is about fit and timing for Northwestern, and I will hit the ground running."

The Northwestern State Presidential Search Committee narrowed the field to two finalists, Jones and Kim LeDuff, after interviewing six semifinalists on Northwestern's campus.

"It's an historic day for Northwestern State," UL System President and CEO Jim Henderson said. "Marcus is an authentic leader of character, integrity, and vision. His familiarity with the community, his passion for student success, and his commitment to excellence will advance our alma mater for the next generation."

During his interview, Jones spoke of the importance of a strong institution for university alumni and the Natchitoches community as a whole. He also discussed his vision for the university working more collaboratively with business and industry to ensure graduates have both the hard skills and soft skills to meet the needs of the global market.

Jones is a native of Winnfield and is the 18th of 20 children. He is a graduate of Northwestern State, Grambling State, and Southern Law Center.



Commencement will take place Dec. 15-16

Northwestern State University will hold Fall 2021 commencement exercises at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. on Wednesday, Dec. 15 and at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Thursday, Dec. 16 in Prather Coliseum.

"We are thrilled to be hosting in-person graduation ceremonies, but we continue to be mindful of public health and safety," said **Dr. Greg Handel**, provost and vice president for Academic Affairs. "We appreciate everyone's understanding and adherence to COVID protocols as we welcome the families and friends of our graduates to campus to celebrate this important milestone."

Graduates will not be limited in the number of guests in attendance. Everyone must wear a mask to enter the building. Guests will be directed to seating and are asked to adhere to social distancing guidelines between families/groups. Saving seats will not be allowed. Guests are asked to remain seated for the duration of the ceremony.

It is recommended that graduates and guests arrive at least 30 minutes prior to each ceremony. Graduates will enter the front of Prather Coliseum, check in and be escorted to their seat. There will be no processional. Guests for graduates with last names beginning with A-L should use entrance and exits on the east side of Prather Coliseum, the side facing the tennis courts. Guests for graduates with last names beginning with M-Z should use entrance and exits on the west side of Prather Coliseum, the side facing the Kappa Sigma House. ADA accessibility entrance is on the West side.

Hand sanitizing stations will be available. Prather Coliseum will be disinfected between ceremonies.

Parking is available around Prather Coliseum

All ceremonies will be livestreamed at **www. nsula.edu** and recorded.

Child Develpment Center director selected as LELA Fellow

Faith Stanfield. director of the Child **Development Center** at Northwestern State University, was one of 24 early childhood directors from across Louisiana named to the third cohort of Louisiana Early Leaders Academy. The Louisiana Early Leaders Academy was created by the Louisiana Department of Education to strengthen leaders in the field of early childhood education and expand access to quality early childhood care and education.

As a Fellow, Stanfield will have the opportunity to enhance leadership skills and boost impact on young learners. Fellows are selected through a competitive application process. The 10-month executive level program is for directors of highly rated publicly funded early learning centers.

The directors are aiming for excellence in

the daily leadership of their early learning centers. They must be certified as reliable in Louisiana's classroom observation tool. Fellows will articulate their vision for personal and professional growth while in the Academy.

LELA will hold training in July and will include virtual and in-person training, opportunities to meet national and

state leaders in early childhood education,

one-on-one coaching to support areas of need and peer learning communities to enhance instructional leadership and quality in early learning programs.

Fellows also learn about managing systems changes, building strong teams and improving program operations, among other content areas. In addition to the new cohort, there are 82 alums from previous Academy cohorts statewide.

NSU relaxes mask mandate, masks still required in classrooms

Following new guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention showing several weeks of sustained improvement to low/moderate transmission of COVID-19 in Natchitoches Parish, Northwestern State University has relaxed its indoor mask mandate effective immediately in public spaces on all campuses for all fullyvaccinated individuals. For those who are not yet fully vaccinated, the indoor mask mandate remains in place. Masks will still be required in classrooms, but not

required in other facilities on campus.

"Out of an abundance of caution as we approach cold and flu season, monitor the fluid situation of COVID-19, and monitor the Omicron variant, the mask mandate will remain in place in the classroom setting for all individuals," said NSU President Dr. Marcus Jones. "Students, faculty and staff are asked to continue to observe COVID-19 health and safety protocols and mitigation measures in classrooms."

The University will continue to monitor COVID-19 trends, including the Omicron variant. Masking protocols are subject to change if transmission patterns and rates increase, or positivity rates in Natchitoches Parish increase. As of today, there have been no reported cases of the Omicron variant in the United States.

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Christmas Gala returns to A.A. Fredericks

The Mrs. H.D. Dear Sr. and Alice E. Dear School of Creative and Performing Arts at Northwestern State University will present the 33rd annual Christmas Gala Dec. 1-3 in the A.A. Fredericks Auditorium. Performance times are 7 p.m. each evening with a 9 p.m. performance on Dec. 3.

This will be the first time in three years a live Christmas Gala will be performed in the renovated A.A. Fredericks Auditorium. The 2019 Gala was moved off campus due to construction in the auditorium. Last year's performance was virtual due to the pandemic.

Tickets are \$15. NSU, BPCC@NSU and Louisiana School for Math, Science and the Arts students are admitted free with a current student I.D.

"The Christmas Gala is eagerly anticipated by both local audiences and our students who perform and work behind the scenes," said Gala Director **Brett Alan Garfinkel.** "The School of Creative and Performing Arts works on the Gala year-round to be sure we provide a memorable event for the community."

The Gala will feature performances by the NSU Jazz Orchestra, "Out on a Limb Improv" Troupe, the NSU Dance Company, NSU Percussion Ensemble, Demon Dazzlers, Demon Heat Colorguard, NSU Brass Choir, NSU Chamber Choir and the Natchitoches-Northwestern-Symphony Orchestra, The Gala story was written by NSU students Olivia Hancock of Dubach, Mekayla Jenkins of Jennings, Mikiah Odom of Marshall. More than 400 Northwestern State students, faculty and staff in the School of Creative and Performing Arts combine their talents to present the Gala as a kickoff to the Natchitoches Christmas Festival. Large crowds attend the Gala each year which is based on the long-running Radio City Music Hall Christmas Spectacular.

Garfinkel said the Gala will combine popular parts from past shows along with new elements that are added this year. He said this year's Christmas Gala will be a version of a Louisiana Nutcracker.

"A Fais-do-do will take the place of the usual Christmas Party," said Garfinkel. "Instead of the Land of the Sweets in Act II the show will take a journey through the Land of Spices. The music and performance acts will have a Louisiana flare."
