Virtual Freshman Connection starts May 21

Northwestern State University's Office of First Year Experience is planning to transition the first two sessions of Freshman Connection to an online format. The NSU leadership will continue to monitor the COVID -19 situation to determine the course of all other sessions of orientation. Students will be notified via email of all changes.

"Freshman Connection is an opportunity for incoming students to meet people who will help make the transition to college a successful one. That won't change," said **Van Erikson**, director of First Year Experience and Leadership Development. "The Class of 2024 will still be able to meet people, visit with their academic advisors, learn about the resources available and how to be a successful first-year Demon.

Incoming students will be able to participate in a series of engaging virtual small group sessions where they will meet classmates and get questions answered. Academic advising and registration will be designed with each student's individual goals in mind. By the end of Freshman Connection, participants will be ready for the fall semester.

Dates for virtual Freshman Connection are May 21-22 and May 28-29. Dates for Freshman Connection on the Natchitoches campus, which is subject to change, are June 17-18 and July 9. Additional sessions are planned for the Alexandria campus on Tuesday, June 23, at the Shreveport campus on Thursday, June 24 and at the Leesville campus on Tuesday, June 30. All



are subject to change, Erikson said, and more information is forthcoming.

The orientation and first-year transition fee will be used in the same manner as always - to develop and implement the orientation program and to create Demon Days Welcome in the fall, Erikson said. Students already registered for Freshman Connection should be checking emails for information and announcements regarding Freshman Connection.

"Our traditional Demon Days Welcome will now incorporate expanded opportunities for our new students with their success in mind," Erikson said. "And we're looking forward to welcoming you to campus a little earlier in the fall."

"Commencement is one of academia's most treasured ceremonies and traditions and one that allows us, as a community, to celebrate our graduates and wish them well



Moulton received a Fulbright Award in 2017 for her work in Nepal, where she served as a consultant and cultural ambassador while launching the country's inaugural degree program in counseling psychology.

In addition to Moulton, the Louisiana Fulbright executive board includes Dr. Harald Leder, Louisiana State University; Dr. Charlotte Maheu-Vail, Tulane University, and Dr. Richard Shrubb, Louisiana Tech University.

As president of the Louisiana chapter, Moulton will serve on the Fulbright Association Chapter Advisory Board, lead the executive board for the state of Louisiana, develop membership, administer the social media communication tools of the Fulbright Association and direct activities in Louisiana for networking, service and education related to Fulbright initiatives.

"Being chosen as a Fulbright Specialist has been the highlight of my career," Moulton said. "It is an honor to be associated with the caliber of professionals that Fulbright brings together across the world. Fulbright has provided a global experience and a global perspective to my work."

Moulton served as a Fulbright Specialist to Nepal in 2018 and has been a member of the Fulbright Association since her return as a Fulbright alumna.

She recently traveled to Thailand to serve as a Fulbright representative and will be working as liaison to the Fulbright Association housed in Washington D.C.

State chapters provide Fulbright alumni and visiting Fulbrighters with diverse opportunities for networking, professional development, mentoring, cultural enrichment, and community service.







'Remembering Louisiana' essay contest guidelines revised

The Louisiana Folklife Center at Northwestern State University has revised guidelines for the 2020 Louisiana High School Essay Contest due to social distancing challenges. The 2020 Contest theme is "Remembering Louisiana."

"Entrants may interview any member of their family or surrounding community as long as their interviewee is at least one generation older than themselves, such as, for example, their parents or guardians," said Dr. Shane Rasmussen, director of the Louisiana Folklife Center. "As well, we encourage entrants to consider remote interviewing methods such as by phone, WebEx, etc., that enable them to converse while still practicing safe social distancing. Entrants may include information from multiple interviewees in their essays if they so choose."

Entrants are invited to discuss how Louisiana has changed over the interviewee's lifetime. What do they feel are the most significant changes they have experienced over their lifetime? Personal reflections and experiences are perfectly valid as part of the essay content. Essays may be

in narrative form if the student chooses.

Submissions for the 12th annual Louisiana High School Essay Contest will be accepted through June 1. The essay contest is open to all Louisiana students in grades 9-12 regardless of type of school institution, including students in all types of private educational environments, as well as home schooled students.

Essays should be 1,000 -2,500+ words, should have titles and should be typed (double spaced, 12-point font, standard margins). Entries should include a cover sheet with the student's name, school affiliation, mailing address, phone number, e-mail address and the title of their entry. Entries may be submitted via e-mail to Dr. Shane Rasmussen, rasmussens@nsula.edu, or mailed to the Louisiana Folklife Center, NSU Box 3663, Natchitoches, LA 71497. The subject line of e-mails should be "2020 NSU Louisiana High School Essay Contest." Prize-winning students will be notified by July 15, 2020.

The prizes for the contest winners are \$150 for first place, \$100 for second place and \$50 for third place. In addition, essay contest winners will

receive a \$200 per semester NSU scholarship with a value up to \$1,600 if they attend NSU for four years.

This award is in addition to other scholarship awards that the student may receive from Northwestern State University. Winners must have at least a 20 ACT composite or 950 on the SAT, as well as at least a 2.0 GPA to be eligible. Essay winners need to submit proof of the award.

Winning essayists will be invited to read their paper at the 12th annual Louisiana Studies Conference held at Northwestern State University in Natchitoches on Saturday September 19. The top three winning entries will also be published in the Louisiana Folklife Journal. Submission of an entry to the Contest entails granting permission to publish the essay in the Louisiana Folklife Journal. Entries may be subject to minor revision prior to publication.

Science and technology students and faculty use biomedical and software skills during pandemic

Science and engineering technology students and faculty at Northwestern State University are lending their expertise to help healthcare providers and the community during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Anna Dugas, an assistant professor of physics, created a COVID-19 face shield and requested permission to use university's Lutzbot Taz 6 3-D FDM printer to print 28 face shields,

and more as needed, to donate to Natchitoches Regional Medical Center. Dugas, a biomedical engineer, has designed medical equipment in the past and intends to recruit others in the NSU community to expand production of the masks.

Since joining the faculty at NSU four years ago, Dugas established the Biological & Electrical Applied Physics (BEAP) lab in the

NSU's Phi Beta Delta board voted to pay a chapter registration fee for the conference, which will allow members, students and anyone in the NSU community to attend, Joy said. "If faculty teach a course with an international focus, they may want to encourage their students to participate, even though May 14-15 is after our school semester ends. School of Biological & Physical Sciences where she works with science and engineering technology students to explore sensor-human interfaces, robotic applications and space/atmosphere-exploration payload design.

"While at home with my two small boys (three and eight years old), I wanted to do a project with them that could help people, and to show them that we can all make a difference, even at home," Dugas said.

Dr. Francene Lemoine, interim dean of the College of Arts and Sciences, collected the three dozen shields Dugas made and delivered them to Natchitoches Regional Medical Center April 30. Dugas hopes to make more in the upcoming weeks and make them available to any clinic in Natchitoches with a need.

Meanwhile, students in the biomedical instrumentation course, part of the engineering technology curriculum, were assigned projects related to understanding ventilators and asked to propose designs to accommodate more patients.

Maleik White of St.
Martinville, who was also an intern at Natchitoches Regional Medical Center, is working with biomedical staff to better understand the ventilator and possible modification.

"Biomedical concentration graduates are prepared to excel in the expanding medical technology field that explores the interface between man and machines used in healthcare facilities," said **Dr. Jafar Al Sharab** said, head of NSU's Department of Engineering Technology.

Students were also

challenged to design and fabricate Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), including face shields. **Dr. Shahriar Hossain**, a new professor in industrial engineering technology, utilized his expertise in technical drafting to design a face shield that takes 70 percent time less to 3D print than other PPEs.

Two students, Daniela
Forero Saldeco and Devin
Reyes, utilized software skills
to design gaming experiences
designed to educate users about
the coronavirus and encourage
them to use PPEs.

The games are intended to provide useful information and alleviate stress for remote learners who have plenty of spare time.

"We tried to encourage ET faculty and students to help with this crisis, each one according to his or her capacity," Al Sharab said. "All the information is available for free for anyone who is willing utilize them and benefit from them at https://engrtech.nsula.

edu. We are planning to make this on-line depository location where other relevant 3D models can be shared. We encourage other faculty members and staff to contact me if they have any relevant design to be shared.

"These are simple examples from ET department, however, it shows that both students and faculty care and try to help with this global issue each one according to his/her capacity and within their area of expertise," Al Sharab added.

"We appreciate our faculty so very much for this incredible outreach. I continue to be amazed at the work of our faculty. This is yet another example of NSU's great partnership and collaboration of our community," said NSU President **Dr. Chris Maggio**.
