NSU film maker wins duPont Award

A documentary film produced by a member of Northwestern State University's New Media faculty won an Alfred I. duPont Award and was featured on the *The Today Show* on Jan. 20. The film, "Love Them First," tells the story of Mauri Melander Friestleben, principal at Lucy Laney Elementary, an underperforming public elementary school in a high-poverty neighborhood in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

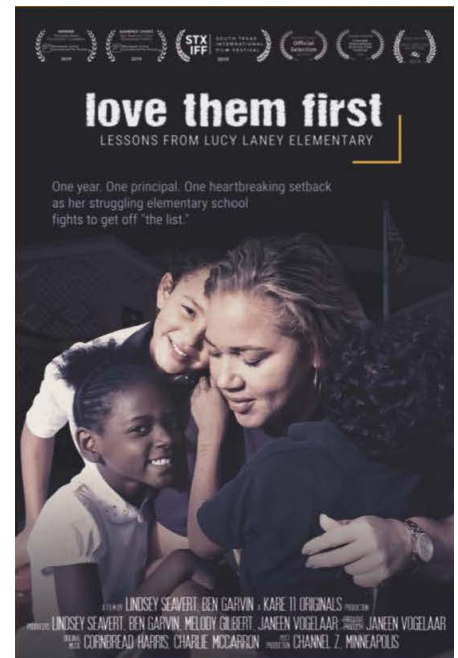
Melody Gilbert, NSU assistant professor and documentary filmmaker, traveled to New York to receive the duPont Award, along with a team from KARE 11 in Minneapolis. The Alfred I. duPont-Columbia University Award honors excellence in broadcast journalism in public service and is considered one of the most prestigious awards in journalism.

"Today Show host Hoda Kotb saw the film on a plane recently and fell in love with it and invited Principal Mauri Friestleben to be on the show on Martin Luther King Day," Gilbert said. "I am proud to be a producer and story consultant on this award-winning documentary."

Gilbert screened the film on the NSU campus last fall. The project began as a series of stories by a team from KARE 11 News over the course of one year and



follows Friestleben's struggle to lift her school from the bottom of Minnesota's underperforming schools list. Reviewers call it a story of inspiration, heartbreak, perseverance and the power of love.

Gilbert is in her first year on faculty in NSU's Department of New Media, Journalism and Communication Arts. She is an award-winning documentary filmmaker and film professor who has directed, produced, shot and sometimes edited seven feature-length documentaries since 2002. She served as a producer for other documentary projects, including "Beneath the Ink," which was nominated for an Emmy for Outstanding Short Documentary; "Women Outward Bound" (2016/PBS) and the James

In celebration of Black History Month, Living Library will discuss ‘Ben Johnson: A Natchitoches Legacy’

Northwestern State University’s second Living Library event will examine the life and legacy of the late Ben D. Johnson (1910-2005), who was for several decades, a business leader, mentor and advocate in Natchitoches’s African American community.

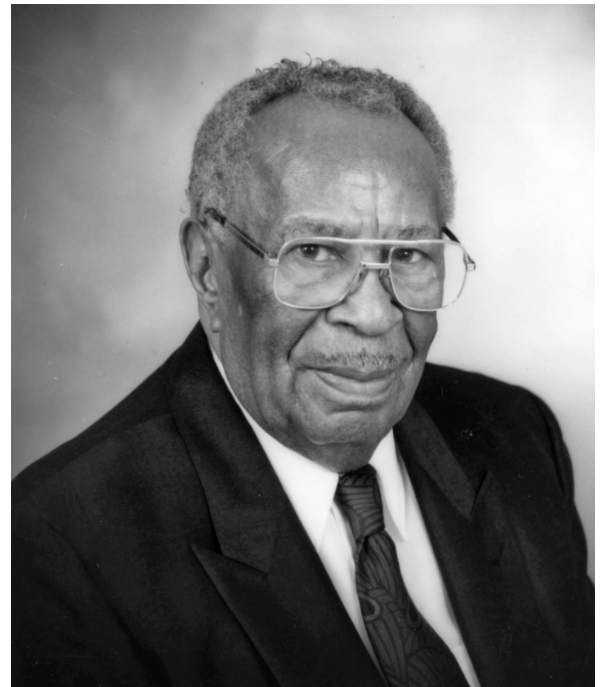
The panel discussion will begin at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 20 in the Ora G. Williams Digital Media Center (NSU TV Studio), Kyser Hall Room 142. Admission is free and open to the public.

Johnson was born in Campti, one of 10 children, and in the 1930s launched a successful funeral home business that became one of the most prominent minority business systems in Louisiana. He was involved in government, civic affairs, youth development and many philanthropic endeavors.

Johnson received many honors throughout a lifetime of service. He was named an honorary Louisiana state senator and awarded an honorary Doctor of Letters from Northwestern State University, where he established the Ben D. Johnson Endowed Professorship in Business. He received the NAACP humanitarian services award was lauded by U.S. President Bill Clinton and South African President Nelson Mandela.

Today, his work lives on through initiatives coordinated by the Ben D. Johnson Education Center, the Legacy Youth Workforce Development Program and the Legacy Café.

Joining the panel to discuss Johnson’s legacy will be his niece Claire Prymus, State Rep. Kenny Cox, Coushatta Mayor Johnny Cox, Edward Ward Jr. and Dr. Marcus Jones. Each will speak and answer questions about Johnson, his impact on their lives and the large footprint

“Ben Johnson: A Natchitoches Legacy” will last about 90 minutes and is being presented by NSU’s Eugene P. Watson Library. The concept of a living library encourages individuals to share their experiences on a specific topic so that listeners get a first-hand account of what the person saw or lived through.

Last year, Gilbert launched a series of film screenings at NSU, including “Love Them First,” and “Silicone Soul,” which premiered on STARZ in

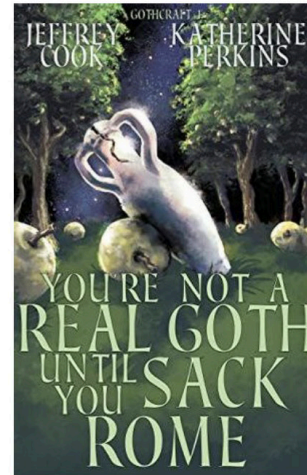
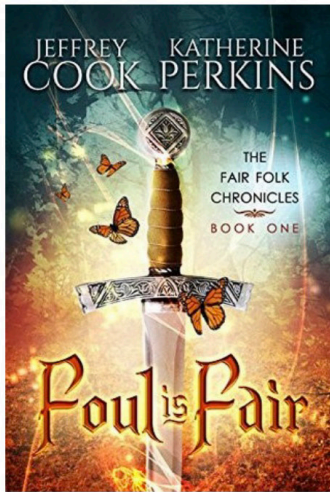
October.

ECE Non-Credit Classes - Feb., 2020

Northwestern State University's Non-Credit Short Courses - February

Phlebotomy Technician Training

This seven (7) week course is broken down into two parts: five (5) weeks of classroom and two (2) weeks of clinical. It is designed to teach entry-level phlebotomy skills to students interested in pursuing a career in Phlebotomy. Students are required to complete 100 clinical hours and 100 venipunctures before they will be allowed to take the board exam. Upon satisfactory completion of this course, students will be eligible to take the National Board Certification Exam on site through the American Certification Agency for Healthcare Professionals. This course also includes Basic Life Support (BLS) Certification through the American Heart Association. NOTE: Possibility of random drug screening at the student's expense at clinical sites.

Requirements for the course:

- ☐ Must provide proof of high school diploma, GED, or official transcript.
- ☐ Must pay \$150 National Board Certification & material fee to instructor the first night of class.
- ☐ Student may purchase required textbook prior to the first night of class: Phlebotomy Essentials, 6th edition (Wolters Kluwer). This book is not available through our bookstore but may be purchased through a variety of online locations. The book may also be checked out from the instructor at no cost. However, it must be understood that if it is returned damaged or not returned at all, there will be a \$60 fee that must be paid before being allowed to sit for the National Board Examination.
- ☐ Set of solid scrubs for clinical days (any color)-**Not needed until clinical begins.**

Cox named UL Staff Member of the Year



Reatha Cox, director of Student Affairs at Northwestern State University, was named Outstanding Staff Member of the Year during the third annual University of Louisiana System's For Our Future Conference that took place on University of Louisiana – Monroe campus last week. Cox was honored for more than 30 years of service and dedication to NSU students. The UL System is comprised of nine universities, including Northwestern State, with a collective enrollment of about 92,000 students. Dr. Jim Henderson, UL System president and an NSU alum, presented the award. About 500 delegates from all nine universities attended the conference, which focused on innovation, integrity and inclusion.

Stan Chadick Math Professorship is near fulfillment

A professorship honoring the memory of Dr. Stan Chadick, a member of the Northwestern State University faculty for 37 years, has almost reached fulfillment, according to faculty in NSU's Department of Mathematics.

Chadick's colleagues in the department, who established the professorship last year to honor the memory of an outstanding teacher, mentor and friend, announced that only \$6,000 remains to reach the goal of \$80,000 that will be matched with \$20,000 from the Board of Regents to create a \$100,000 endowment. Income from the endowment will be awarded to a professor in the department who will carry on Chadick's legacy of working with mathematics teachers at all levels.

Chadick, a professor

emeritus, passed away in 2017. During his tenure at NSU, he served as a full-time faculty member, head of the Department of Mathematics and the first director of the Louisiana Scholars' College. He was the curriculum coordinator at the Louisiana School for Math, Science, and the Arts at the school's inception where he helped develop the curriculum and supervised the 45 teachers at LSMSA during the first two years.

Chadick was one of three teachers to receive NSU's first Distinguished Faculty Award in 1987. He was one of two teachers to receive the first Alumni Association's Outstanding Teaching Award in 1990. He was awarded the Northwestern State University President's Distinguished Service Award in 2005.

Before his retirement, he was recognized as NSU's most prolific grant writer. After retirement, the Mathematical Association of America Louisiana-Mississippi Section selected Chadick as recipient of the Certificate of Merit given every five years to a member of the Section. He also received the Louisiana Association of Teachers of Mathematics' first Lifetime Service Award in Mathematics Education. In 2014, NSU awarded Chadick an honorary Doctorate of Applied Science.
